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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

It gives me great pleasure to provide you with an overview of life at University Senior College in 2022.

An obvious highlight for 2022 has been the 20th Anniversary of the College. Although relatively young, University Senior College has cemented itself as a premier senior secondary college within South Australia due to its unique physical location, and its ethos and culture that appeal to young people today and their families.

The year commenced with Orientation to assist students to begin their year constructively, albeit in a truncated fashion due to COVID-19. In fact, Year 3 of COVID-19 brought education in South Australia more disruption than the previous two years. The academic year began with most classes online; and by the end of 2022, the majority of students and staff had contracted COVID-19 at least once. When all students were able to return to face-to-face learning, celebrations for the 20th Anniversary began. There were cupcakes along with gifts from the College for students and staff. The opportunity to purchase commemorative T-shirts and wine were additional ways to celebrate the College's Anniversary. While the usual old scholar events ran, there was a cocktail event for past and present staff and students, held at the Wine Centre in late

September. What is increasingly apparent, is that staff and students are proud of their associations with the College, and the College is true today to its original values and intentions, that is, to prepare students for their university pathways. Such events do not happen on their own, and while a raft of old scholars and staff worked hard to ensure the success of celebrations this year, Vanessa Grave must be recognised for her foresight, leadership and professionalism, which ensured the College was celebrated appropriately. Thanks also to the staff who were part of the Committee, namely Michelle Giavis, Karen Boyd, Lynn Jackson, Pranay Sharma, Michael Jacobsen and Tash Pressley, and the Old Scholars who took part in events.

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One of our Graduate Attributes is resilience, and it became increasingly apparent as 2022 unfolded, that our school community strengthened this attribute, particularly our Year 12 students. The 2022 graduates have experienced disruption to their schooling over the last three years and have demonstrated on numerous occasions, their resilience and motivation. Our adult learning environment assists our young adults to develop many attributes and achieve their personal best, and the students of 2022 have certainly continued



the strong focus on developing self in all facets.

With COVID-19 in the community, interruptions to the teaching and learning program were inevitable, but staff and students remained resolute, and from my conversations with other Principals across the state, I believe University Senior College was not as adversely affected as other schools in South Australia. This is in great part due to our dedicated teaching staff who willingly took classes for unwell colleagues to ensure continuity of the learning program so that our students were not adversely affected by staff absence. I sincerely thank all our staff for their dedication to our students and the College.

While we had already adopted virtual and face to face tours to replace our Open Days after COVID-19 hit, 2022 visitor numbers increased significantly when compared with 2020 and 2021. In 2020, with the onset of COVID-19, there were 76 events, 224 students and 253 families, making a total of 335 visitors to USC. In 2021, we conducted two or three tours a week, which culminated in 98 tours of USC by 369 students, 360 families and 669 visitors in total. This year, however, we conducted four tours per week, and at the time of writing, there had been 114 events, 393 students, 385 families, and a total of 724 people attending tours of the College. The visitors were seeking enrolment for 2023 and some even for 2024 or 2025. In just three years, we have doubled the number of visitors and tours and the requests for enrolment continue to increase. This is good news. It is recognition from the community that what USC offers is a valued pathway into university, and a challenging and rigorous learning program in an adult learning environment.

Curriculum review regularly, and this year, Simon Sypek, Director Academic Programs reviewed our curriculum with faculty leaders, and developed new electives for Year 10 for 2023, specifically a STEM and a Humanities integrated subject. These two new offerings will complement the Creative Arts choice at Year 10, and we look forward to the impact these new courses will have in 2023. This year, we saw the addition of Stage 2 Earth and Environmental Science to our curriculum offerings and Psychology at Year 10. The addition of Earth and Environmental Science has allowed us to make further connections with The University of Adelaide, and to provide students with opportunities to connect their learning to real life situations. Psychology, an immensely popular subject at USC, has been embraced by our Year 10s. Its introduction was to whet students' appetites, but also to continue our commitment to offer a Year 10 program with a difference.



New to the Year 11 and Year 12 Mentoring programs this year, were presentations by Dr Tessa Opie, which focused on respectful relationships, sex education and consent. Year 10 students engaged in the SHINE education package on the same topics, led by our counsellors and Year 10 Mentors. Sessions were well received by students and will continue to be part of our program moving forward.

The year was also marked by the opening of a new home for our Music program. Part of the ground floor in the PARC Arcade now is known as Raw Space Music, University Senior College. Music students and staff were excited with the opening of the space, which comprises a music classroom, four practice rooms and an office. In 2023 a podcast recording studio will also be housed in Raw Space and we look forward to the innovative ways it will be used across the College.

Staff new to the College this year, and appointed to ongoing positions include Matthew Noble, Director School Operations; Di Prosser Timetable Manager; Michele Landers Finance Officer; Ondine Caon Learning Support Coordinator; and Liesl McPeake teacher of History and English. Staff who completed 12-month contracts include Samuel Franzway, Ana Diaz, Alana Giles Lawson and Olivia Saunders. I am pleased to inform you, however, that Ana Diaz, Alana Giles Lawson, and Olivia Saunders will be returning to USC in 2023 as will Samuel Franzway and Angela Joy. I am thrilled to announce that most staff who have been with us in 2022 will continue in 2023. This is great news, as a steady school in terms of staff, is a settled, happy and secure place for students. However, staff who have chosen to retire at the end of 2022 include Carolyn Woods Laboratory Manager; Peta Pariossien Philosophy teacher and Wendy Jacobs Economics and Research Project teacher.

I would like to thank all staff at University Senior College for their ongoing commitment to the students in our care. Each day, the academic staff show professionalism and dedication to the cause, supporting the collective and individual students during lectures, tutorials and classes, but also in the countless hours of Availability sessions offered to individual students across all year levels. To our administration staff, who work diligently responding to enrolment enquiries, conducting tours, supporting the day-to-day operations of the College and responding to all matters technological; thank you for your efforts in ensuring University Senior College maintains its reputation as a welcoming and respectful environment. To each member of the College leadership team, Ann Rayson, Anna Bassani, Corey Barrett, Simon Sypek, Matthew Noble, Vanessa Grave and Karen Boyd, the work you do often goes unnoticed, but I know those legs are frantically paddling underwater, as you glide around the school supporting students and staff and ensuring we continue to be, what I believe is the best senior secondary college in South Australia, known for its exceptional work in supporting students onto their university pathway.

Our work at University Senior College is made easier with the support of a forward thinking and energetic Council. I wish to extend my gratitude to all Council members, particularly Dr Paul Dalby, Council Chair. We have spent a year discussing the broad strategic questions for USC as we move into our third decade, and Dr Paul Dalby, along with other Council members, Professor Suzanne Le Mire, Dr Ben Grindlay, Ms Celia Le, Ms Yvette Winter, Mr Graeme Hodge and Mr Brian Simons, have worked to ensure USC flourishes under their leadership. I sincerely thank each member of Council for their contributions to USC in 2022.

ACHIEVEMENTS AGAINST OUR USC ASPIRATIONS 2022

ASPIRATION 1: NURTURE A RESPECTFUL, DIVERSE, AND COHESIVE COMMUNITY.

RECONCILIATION STATEMENT

A group of Politics, Legal Studies and other interested students worked with Tyson Wood to develop a USC Reconciliation Statement. This initiative was also supported by Nadia Lovett and a launch of the Statement was held on Thursday 2 June. Uncle Rod from Wirltu Yarlu in The University of Adelaide launched the Statement and performed a smoking ceremony. An Acknowledgement to Country has a prominent place in the two reception areas for the College.

THE RATION CHALLENGE

A group of staff and students chose to take part in the Ration Challenge this year and lived off the same weekly rations refugees are provided in Jordan refugee camps. Rations included a small amount of rice, flour, lentils, chickpeas, beans, fish and oil. The group raised over \$15,000 to assist in supplying emergency food, healthcare and life saving support to Syrian and Ukrainian refugees. This initiative is one example of student agency and students and staff demonstrating empathy, care for others and a commitment to international causes.

HEALTH EDUCATION

Since the beginning of 2021, the issue of consent has been in the media and one consequence has been a mandate from government for all schools to provide education on this issue and related matters. In 2021, the leadership team discussed how best to introduce this topic to our students. Our Year 10 Mentors and Dean, Ann Rayson also took part in the SHINESA program and led mentoring sessions focused on positive relationships and sexual health.



We also decided to offer the program led by Dr Tessa Opie, In Your Own Skin to Years 11 and 12. Dr Tessa Opie led the program on sexual health and healthy relationships with our students. She also conducted a parent information session for interested parents on these topics.

Students were appreciative of the opportunity to discuss important issues related to positive relationships and sexual health that broaden the discussion beyond biological factors.

DR TOM NEHMY

USC Year 11 and 12 Mentoring sessions were held at the Palace Nova Cinema in Rundle Street. Dr Tom Nehmy presented, on learning strategies and wellbeing. 'How to have a Healthy Mind in Year 11'. The interactive workshop included students doing a review of their current wellbeing, as well as Dr Nehmy building our understanding of working towards Health Achievement and Stress Management. Dr Nehmy undertook further work with our Year 11 students in a follow up 'Healthy Minds' session.



CHANNEL 7 YOUNG ACHIEVERS AWARD

This year's USC Young Achievers Create Change Awardee is Callum MacPherson. Callum is a journalist who personally funds and runs a podcast for men's mental health, while he works with SAHMRI. He began his podcast endeavour when one of his friends took their own life. Callum was also voted as the 2022 Young Achiever for South Australia.

USC continues to support this Award as we view it as an opportunity to give back to young people and our Award, the Create Change award, is reflective of USC's ethos.

AI PRESENTATION

Dr Paul Dalby, Chairperson of the University Senior College Council, delivered a productive and inspiring presentation on Artificial Intelligence, its role in the future for Australia, university pathways and career opportunities, and Al's impact on other fields. Our students and staff appreciated hearing firsthand from an expert in the field and were grateful for Dr Dalby's time. This presentation enhanced the importance of our diverse curriculum which challenges students and offers authentic pathways into university.

DESIGN AND CREATIVITY

Drew Joyce, Creative Director of 'Working Images' delivered an amazing graphic design presentation to USC Year 11 Design classes. Drew's area of expertise is vast; however, he focused on wine label design and the processes he goes through, from the initial design brief to the final printing and application to wine bottles. This presentation inspired the students as they work towards finalising their concepts for Lambrook Wines, the company whose product was part of our 20th Anniversary celebrations.

WOMEN IN SPACE: IMPACTING THE WORLD AND BEYOND

As part of the USC STEM focus, fifteen students and staff from USC attended the Women in Space event to hear from leaders of the space industry firsthand, learn about the nation's space capability and why the space industry is so important to South Australia. 'Inspiring, Empowering, Advancing' were the drivers of this event. Female leaders from within the space industry came together to share their rich experiences and inspire greater participation in this exciting and growing sector of the South Australian economy. This was a great opportunity for some of our students who were proactive in making connections with the scientists to ask questions regarding their Research Project and their broader interests in STEM. RESEARCH PROJECT RESULTS

The 2022 results for the Research Project showed once again, that USC students are able to successfully engage in self-directed learning. The results released in July were outstanding. Three students, Anita Kalyanik, Joanna Beji Daniel and Teresa Bueti(2021) all received a perfect score. 55% of the students who undertook the Research Project gained an A grade, with 16% registering A+ grades, and two students received a perfect score.

AUSTRALIAN SCHOOLS CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

Amber Brock-Fabel and Alessandro Tedesco were two of twelve delegates chosen to represent South Australia at this year's National Schools Constitutional Convention after their notable contributions at the 2021 South Australian Schools Constitutional Convention.

This year's National Convention was held at Parliament House in Adelaide as an online forum with successful candidates from other states and territories. While it was disappointing the Convention was unable to be held in Canberra as planned, it was a valuable learning experience as the South Australian team contributed to discussion and debate on 'Does Australia need a Bill of Rights?'.

Selection to be part of the Convention is a significant honour and was a proud moment for Amber and Alessandro representing University Senior College. I wish to acknowledge the school's contact teacher Tyson Wood for his commitment to the Convention Program and for providing students the opportunity to engage in this authentic learning experience.

ANJALI BEAMES AND SA STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL

Anjali was selected by the Commissioner for Children and Young People as one of the participants on the South Australian Student Representative Council (SA SRC), a wonderful achievement. Anjali is incredibly engaged and active in civic participation and South Australian politics.

EARTH AND ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE

Georgia McLeod, Year 12 student at University Senior College, gained an interview with Rory Moore, President and CEO of Arctic Canadian Diamond Mines, for her Earth and Environmental Science topic, 'Earth's Resources.'

Georgia found interviewing Rory Moore to be very helpful for her assignment. He gave her an indepth understanding of both the old and the new environmentally friendlier diamond mining methods at Ekati Diamond Mine in Canada's Northwest Territories. He also described the collaboration between the local indigenous community and the benefits the mine providesto them.

Georgia learned that implementing the new mining method will extend the life of the diamond mine. Interviewing Rory Moore, CEO of Arctic Canadian Diamond Mines, opened Georgia's mind to the world of diamond mining. Her initiative to source an interview via video meeting was encouraged by the skills she developed through her Research Project in Year 11.



Christine Welsh, another Year 12 student, worked with Enviro Copper, specifically with the CEO, Phillipa Faulkner to study the effects of slow rate on environmental copper removal at their new Kapunda mine site. Christine visited the site once a fortnight, testing the bore water to assess whether the flow rates were conducive for maximum copper removal. Feedback back from Phillipa was very positive and as a result of Christine's initiative, she has changed her career aspiration to environmental geoscience.

Both Georgia's and Christine's experiences highlight the importance USC places on independent learning and student agency.

YEAR 11 DRAMA PRODUCTION

Year 11 Drama Production, The Roses of Eyam by Don Taylor, told the story of a small town in Derbyshire in 1666, which employed extraordinary methods to avoid the spread of the Black Plague. The performances were exceptional and Year 12 Drama in 2023 looks promising.

YEAR 12 DRAMA PRODUCTION

University Senior College Year 12 Drama presented "The Commune" by Gabriel Bergmoser. Performing in the Little Theatre on The University of Adelaide campus, two different casts wowed the audience with the dramatic and psychological thriller over two nights.

2022 MOCK TRIALS

The University Senior College Mock Trial team performed brilliantly again, under the expert tutelage of Janine Campbell, our Legal Studies teacher and coach Barnaby Grant, a prosecuting solicitor for SA Police. Our students competed in the Grand Final against Seymour College and were overall winners of this year's competition. Tilda Blyeveld won Best Barrister for the round also, which saw her receive a week's internship with Judge Stanley. This is the second time our Legal Studies students have won the Mock Trials since Janine Campbell joined the College and the third occasion overall.

PLANET TALKS

Over the March long weekend University Senior College Year 12 student, Amber Brock-Fabel was a guest speaker in the opening address of the Adelaide Festival's inaugural Climate Crisis and the Arts. In addition to this, Amber was on a panel at WOMAD Planet Talks, Meet the Change Makers, looking at ways to reimagine our relationship to the planet. Also in March, Amber was a guest speaker at the Youth Climate Summit at Victor Harbor.

THE CENTENARIAN PORTRAIT PROJECT BY TEENAGERS

The Centenarian Portrait Project by Teenagers is an uplifting initiative matching 100 teenage artists with 100 of South Australia's most senior citizens. Two USC students selected to be part of the project, grew to know their 100-year-old sitters and thoughtfully captured their spirit and lifetime



of stories. The portraits were undertaken by Sophie King (Year 10), whose work is a Portrait of Joan Minson (b. 3/6/1922) was composed using graphite pencil on paper. The other by Tilda Byleveld (Year 11), whose work was a Portrait of Velta Ozols (b. 13/2/1922), an oil on canvas.

PLAIN SPEAKING COMPETITION

One of our Year 11 students, Jessica Grasser won the final of the 'Plain English Speaking' Competition. The competition comprised of three categories: a prepared speech, an interview and a three minute impromptu speech. Jessica performed superbly in all three. Thanks go to Judith Mohan for supporting Jessica in this endeavour.



2022 SALA EXHIBITIONS

The USC SALA exhibition, 'In The Making', featured selected works by USC Year 10, 11, 12 Art and Design students. These artists and designers in the making, explored fashion design, painting, sculpture and digital drawing. The range of works selected for the Exhibition reflected the diversity of styles and interests of USC Art and Design students. Raw Space University Senior College was the perfect location for the exhibition, and it was wonderful to see members of the public stop and admire the students' work.

STEM COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS AND PARTNERSHIPS

The STEM focus at USC aims to ignite passion for STEM and assist students and staff to deepen their knowledge, challenge their thinking and ensure we provide authentic learning opportunities.

As part of USC STEM Community Connections and Partnerships with The University of Adelaide, several tours of various departments were undertaken this year, all tailored for USC needs. Our students visited research laboratories and heard from academic staff and Ph.D. students about realworld issues firsthand.

Students visited and engaged with staff in Aerospace, Mechanical, Electrical and Electronic engineering departments and the Andy Thomas Centre for Space Resources. They attended a community focused seminar on campus, involving a guest speaker from NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory, hearing about NASA's Plans for the Dark Universe and attended Women in Space – Impacting the World and Beyond seminar at National Wine Centre.

These activities engaged students in high levels of learning while developing their critical thinking skills, thus increasing student interest and achievement. Students visited CSI Adelaide and learned about the Somerton Man mystery from Prof. Derek Abbott, Science from Dr Nicole Foster, Optical Fibres from Prof Shahram Afshar and Nuclear Medicine from Prof. Eva Bezak.

THE SOMERTON MAN

Professor Derek Abbott from The University of Adelaide delivered a talk on The Somerton Man to our students. In his recent findings that were widely publicised in Australian media, we now know the identity of the man: The Somerton Man identified as Carl Webb, was a Melbourne electrical engineer and was born in 1905.Some USC students and USC STEM Coordinator, Zahra Pirvali, visited Professor Derek Abbott in the Engineering Department to ask further questions about this case. This investigation was a clear example on how Sciences, Engineering, Mathematics, Art, and History came together to solve one of Australia's most enduring mysteries.

AUSTRALIAN INSTITUTE OF PHYSICS 2022

This year South Australia is hosting the Australian Institute of Physics (AIP) Congress to be held at the Adelaide Convention Centre on 11-16 December 2022. Zahra Pirvali, Physics teacher, was the Recipient of the 2017 Excellence in Physics Teaching Award from the SA Branch of the AIP, is the the program coordinator of the Education sessions that are high school related. One outcome of this is that Zahra is presenting in one of the sessions along with three other university professors: Prof. Derek Abbott, Prof. Eva Bezak and Dr. Laura Greene. The theme of the session is Igniting Passion for Physics. As one of our most enthusiastic teachers, Zahra will represent USC well at this event.

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PARTNER'S PATHWAY 2022

This year was the second year of the new iteration of the Partner's Pathway. Students needed to maintain A grades through Year 11 and until the trial examinations in Year 12 and have received an A grade for the Research Project. This year, 46 students met all criteria and were considered for the Pathway, which is an unconditional offer into most undergraduate degrees at The University of Adelaide. 32 students accepted the offer from The University of Adelaide, as a number of other students have degrees in their sights that require more than an ATAR score for entry.





HEADSTART 2022

The University of Adelaide's Headstart scholarship program gives high achieving students the opportunity to study at The University while still in Year 12. These university studies count towards their SACE and ATAR. Under this program, students undertake university subjects and subsequently, if they enrol in a relevant course at the University, will be granted credit towards their undergraduate degree.

University Senior College is ideally situated to take advantage of the Headstart program, with students already on campus and operating on the same timetable. In 2022, twenty-five University Senior College students were awarded a Headstart Scholarship and chose to replace one or supplement their Year 12 subjects with a variety of university subjects. These students are to be commended, as they have independently engaged with this learning opportunity, exemplifying our Graduate Attributes and consequently achieved some outstanding results.

YEAR 10 HISTORY

Year 10 USC History students were immersed in a university style approach to learning when they visited the University and spent a double lesson with Dr Gareth Pritchard, senior lecturer in History at the School of Humanities, The University of Adelaide. Dr Pritchard shared his knowledge and passions of the study of History through an exploration of: Eugenics and Nazi Ideology, the Liberation of the Nazi concentration camps 1944-45, the Dropping of the Bomb on Japan and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Students were invited to engage in discussion about the application of individual versus group rights via a case study, and the analysis of the historiography of the use of the atomic bombs in Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

LUNCHTIME CAREER INFORMATION SESSIONS

Anna Bassani, Year 12 Dean of Student Experience, organised Career Sessions at lunchtime throughout this year, which included medicine, dentistry, allied health, engineering, psychology, law, business, finance, criminology, teaching and the arts, sciences and careers in the defence force. These sessions complemented the Careers Expo and provided students with additional information to consider, as they planned their tertiary pathways.

USC CAREER EXPO

The second USC Career Expo was held this year, with the great help of Sasha Champion, from the Futures Students of The University of Adelaide. All University faculties were represented, including SET (Science Engineering Technology), ABLE (Arts Business Law Economics) and Health. Vanessa Grave organised for ten Old Scholars to take part and they joined The University booths to share their experiences with students and parents. Several industries were represented also, including Deloittes, Rising Sun Pictures, Active Bodies Physiotherapy, BHP and BMT Maritime Engineering.
